

I did receive some comments from people who were disappointed that it wasn't more of a contest feel to the Sprint. They have a point in that you shouldn't launch into a full blown chat during a four hour Sprint, but I personally don't think it hurts to take a minute to say thanks for the contact, or nice to see you again or quickly arrange to meet someone on the frequency after the Sprint has ended. FISTS activities are meant to get people on the air to have fun. To some people, that is interpreted as cut throat contesting. I don't have a problem with being competitive, I used to enjoy contesting myself (back when FISTS had a couple hundred members and I had time to get on the air, hi!) and understand the impatience with people who give you their life story during a serious contest. But there are dozens of "real" contests scattered out thru the year. For the FISTS activities, how about bringing it down a peg or two, take a deep breath and get on the air just for the fun of chasing down FISTS members? I'm not saying you should engage in long chats, but don't be upset if someone gives more info than the exchange requires. Just say thanks for the info, hope to CUL or something similar and go on to the next contact.

There were a lot of comments about making the Sprint a seasonal activity, I wonder if the interest is really out there? Or would it dilute the amount of activity if there were 4 Sprints?

I have to check the ARRL contest calendar to make sure there are no conflicts, but I'm thinking of adding one the second weekend in January (we have the NR in February), and August. Let's have a vote - if you'd like two more Sprints (Summer and Winter) drop Tom ACSJH a note at 4346 Rose Garden Cir, Zachary LA, 70791. While you're at it, add your two cents - are the Sprints too casual, should they be more contest-like in the exchange?

The winning certificates haven't been sent out yet, so please be patient on that. Thanks to Tom for tabulating the results: The Spring Sprint is coming up May 9 1700Z-2100Z so mark your calendar!

I hope you read David Sumner's editorial in the April QST, The Joy Of CW. I send ARRL HQ a copy of the KeyNote each month, suppose they're reading it and taking the FISTS philosophy to heart? How Do I....in more detail

Included in each issue of the KeyNote is a page titled "How Do I..." It covers where and how to get things like FISTS supplies, have info about FISTS sent to friends, all sorts of things. But it's impossible to cover every possible question that comes up on one page reference sheet, so I'll try to devote a space each KeyNote to questions and answers that come up.

Stan, K4UK, from the FISTS QSL Bureau sends along a couple of interesting questions he received concerning QSL cards:

Question: Is it acceptable to the FISTS QSL Bureau to use the back side of a QSL card for a short note? Answer: We have no problem with personalized notes anywhere on either side of the card, as long as the call of the station addressed to is legible.

<u>Question</u>: Is it acceptable to the FISTS QSL Bureau to make attachments to a QSL card (i.e. eyeball card or photos).

Answer: We have forwarded letters and photos in envelopes which have been paper clipped or taped to QSL cards. This also is no problem, but the envelope (or any attachment) should have the call sign put on it. Then, if it gets separated from the card, we can still get it in the right SASE. Of course we don't want the attachments to get out of hand. The Bureau's main job is to see that QSL cards are distributed.

Our main concern is that the Call Sign of the station to which the card is being sent be clear and legible! You'd be surprised at the number of cards where we have to guess at the call sign. Sometimes we have to consult the FISTS mailing list to determine who it might be. Of course, if you include their FISTS number, it makes it easier to determine to whom it should be directed.

*** Special Event ***

To commemorate the aircraft carrier-launched B-25 WWII Raid led by Jimmy Doolittle 56 years ago on April 18, 1942, the Stu Rockafellow Amateur Radio Society (SPARS), of Plymouth, MI will be operating a Special Event Station from the Yankee Air Force Museum.

This museum at Willow Run Airport in Belleville, MI has 27 aircraft on display including a B-25D. B-25's were effective medium bombers of WWII, best remembered for their role in the Doolittle Raid against Japan. They were the first medium bombers to fly off of an aircraft carrier (the USS Hornet). Sixteen B-25's crewed by 80 men participated in the air attack. In addition to Tokyo, the planes bombed Nagoya, Osaka and Kobe. Although damage caused by the attack was relatively light, the mission avenged Pearl Harbor and was a tremendous moral booster for U.S. armed forces and civilians.

Bob AA8YO #3056 will be operating CW on 30 meters with a target frequency of 10.116. They've secured a special 1x1 callsign for the upcoming special event, N8D.

QRP With John Shannon K3WWP

Once again this month, your contributions make up my column. Thank you, and like the old saying goes, "Keep those cards and letters coming". I guess that should now include Emails. HI.

I worked Dick on the air, and he followed up our QSO with the following: Greetings John, I really enjoy your column in the Keynote. Your info on QRP operating is really interesting. I decided to get on QRP and purchased a kit from Ten Tec and started to do some kit building. The question I have is that have you any experiences with "Ten Tec" kits? Good luck and again, I enjoy reading your experiences in QRP. Sincerely, Dick WDOHBW.

No Dick, I have not had any experiences with any commercial transmitters (kits or otherwise) except for using my friend's QRP Plus rig. I build all my own transmitting gear from scratch. All I can say is that I have worked hams using just about every conceivable QRP kit, and they all sound very good. I have links to many of the QRP kit sites on my web site if you want to look for more info that way.

And Cal writes: I have enjoyed all your articles in the keynote. Keep up the good work. I am thinking of building a qrp kit and I would like you to tell me how to zero beat the other station. I have been zero beating my IC 737 by sending my side tone while adjusting the other stations tone to mine, this seems to work ok, but my Icom has a switch to take me out of the transmit mode. I don't think a qrp kit will be able to do this. Any help you can give will be appreciated. tnx es 72-73 Cal. AA8VM #2472

Well Cal, that is something that is hard to answer because every rig is slightly different as far as zero beating goes. The case where a separate transmitter and receiver is used is the easiest to be sure you are exactly zero beat. You simply turn on the VFO portion of the transmitter and tune the VFO till your tone matches the signal you are listening to, and you are zero beat. With transceivers, it's somewhat more tricky, I think. When you tune in a station so that his tone is set to whatever the offset frequency is for that particular xcvr, you are zero beat. However, unless you have perfect pitch, it's hard to tell when that tone is 700 Hz, 800 Hz or whatever. And of course, you have to be sure to have all the incremental tuning gadgets (RIT, XIT, etc.) turned off when you do that or you will most likely not even be close to zero beat. I'd like to hear from those of you who use the commercial or kit xcvrs with your tips on zero beating. It is something that needs to be learned. I often get answers to

my CQ's that are way off zero beat, and that shouldn't be unless the station is using a Xtal.

Next this from Corb, who writes often with always interesting info: Hi John, I would like your thoughts on something. Yesterday I received a QSL from OX/OZ8AE. On the back he indicated that he did not fill out the card using /QRP after my call since I had not used the QRP designation during our QSO. I seldom if ever use the /QRP designation and I never use it in contest or "pile up" situations. (I never use it either, Corb - it's not necessary - is) When I send out my QSL I indicate that I was operating QRP and describe my equipment. I don't request that my QRP status be acknowledged. Roughly half of the cards that I receive indicate K8UCL/QRP. The contests and awards that I'm aware of either take your word for QRP ops or don't recognize QRP at all. I suppose I should be concerned if trying for a 2xQRP award. And when I applied for WAC QRP I did make sure that I used cards that indicated QRP, since I had heard that the ARRL can be touchy about such things. Otherwise, do I need concern myself whether a QSL from someone has /QRP after my callsign?

Nope. I know I used QRP when I worked someone. I don't need them to tell me I did by putting / QRP on my QSL. If they want to put it there, fine. If they request I put it after their call on a QSL, I'll do it. As far as I am personally concerned, if anyone doubts I used QRP, I don't care. If any awards demand my cards have /QRP on them, I just won't bother getting that award. As far as the ARRL goes, my WAC and WAS QRP awards/endorsements were gotten with regular cards without /QRP after my call.

Corb continues: Congrats on your RAC Winter Contest score. You'll probably take US honors again. I did OK - 58 QSOs with 18 multipliers. Might take 8th call area again, hope so, enjoy getting those certificates you know. You're doing a great job with your web site, it's coming along great. 73, Corb, K8UCL

Corb and I both had a ball in the ARRL DX contest with our QRP and simple wire antennas. I had 179 QSO's in 106 band-countries for my most ever in a DX contest. Corb had 92 QSO's in 60 multipliers. We both worked Romania for the first time (YO3APJ). Corb got HC2, PY0F, and LU1ZC (South Shetlands) for new countries also. He now has 114. I also got ES and LU1ZC (after the contest) for a total of 137. Proof you don't need much to work DX - just a little determination. Out of space. Net Courtesy

When a CW net is in progress on any band that we are listening to, it is not good operating procedures to start calling CQ right under or right above that net. A good net control station has to leave his filter off in order to hear the 'weak' stations that are a 'bit' off frequency so he can check them into the net. Anyone else listening to the net is not going to give you a call, because they are checked into that net and waiting for the net control to give them traffic or instructions.

Traffic is a message from one amateur sent to another amateur for delivery to a third party. This is the reason Hiram Percy Maxim, W1AW, was able to talk our congress into letting the amateurs back on the air after the World War I. The navy was doing the communicating for the country and didn't want to let the amateurs back on the air. Hiram got a group of amateurs together and told the congress that the amateurs could do this very well. The second R in the ARRL means the 'relaying' of messages, or traffic. The ARTS net relays traffic for all, including messages to and from FISTS. Please give us a bit of room, and check in if you hear the net.'

Sunday Slow Speed Chat Group

Bill VE5HQ wrote to me, saying he would be interested in joining a slow ragchewing group or net on the weekend and asked if FISTS had one. We don't, so I suggested Bill start one! That's the way most of our activities get started, I'm infamous for putting people to work. We didn't want to infringe on the Century Award Net, even though that's a number exchange net, so we decided to try 15 meters on 21.158 at 1700 UTC.

Bill would like to hear from FISTS who are interested in being a net control station on a regular rotation basis. His Email address is <ve5hq@gpfn.sk.ca>

The details have to be worked out yet, but we envision something very casual as Bill says "This will definitely NOT be a black tie net...a bit of a ragchew/ number exchange thing ... so you might mention anyone thinking of helping just has to know CW at abt 10 wpm and be able to wear jeans in comfort. This will be a "S L O - N E T"...designed for those FISTS working toward their 13 wpm as well as those who just don't get into the faster CW...This net is for you!! You also have to like a bit of fun...no stuffed shirts allowed. Controllers must be patient and willing to work whatever speed between 5 and 10 wpm. Slow nets can be time consuming, so it may require one to operate for a few hours. Once the net shuts down, there is no law saying anyone has to leave the freq. NCS will more or less get things started...get a list of who's on freq., maintain some order. (we hope)...and then I'm sure all will fall into place."

It will take a while for the net to catch on, so if you don't hear anyone on frequency, put out a CQ FISTS call - there WILL be people listening for you!

CFAV "Endeavour"/CYWK At Sea

If you read the Welcome to the New FISTS portion of the KeyNote this month, you probably noticed the callsign listed as CYWK/CZDQ and wondered if I made a super typo. Well, I didn't; those are ships! Here is a letter of "explanation" from new FISTS member Paul DuMesnil. It's long, but I think it will be of interest, specially to those FISTS interested in maritime operation. In the text following, "tfc" is short for "traffic". Here is his story:

I'm probably the only permanently employed seagoing Radio Officer in Canada today. There are none that I know of on the very few (if any) deep-sea ships flying the Canadian flag and, on Gov't ships such as Canadian Coast Guard icebreakers, there doesn't seem to be any (at least not attached to the vessel yearround) these days. Up until last Winter ('96-'97) I could still hear CW activity on 500kHz (calling & distress frequency in the medium-range) from a couple of Coast Guard ships. But none yet this season. In the Summer, there could be an operator carried on the large icebreakers which tour the Canadian Arctic but there again I am doubtful whether or not there is a RIO carried onboard any Coast Guard ship. So it could be that I AM THE ONLY RADIO OFFICER IN CANADA!

With Halifax Radio/VCS closing down all CW activities (both in MF and HF) and HF SSB (voice) thus completely eliminating long-range comms from Canada, I have had a terrible time trying to plug my traffic thru when outside the MF range of the former VCS's TXs which are now remote-controlled by Sydney Radio/VCO. What I've done so far is establish daily skeds with VCO, they answering on 446kHz CW and me on one of the HF CW bands (4, 6 or 8mHz and even on 2836kHz CW). It works as long as I'm willing to strain my ear trying to hear a MF signal with only 1kW which gets weaker and weaker as we get further and further away from Nova Scotia. It usually works during daylight hours almost at the Bermuda latitude but that's stretching it. Good thing that I am sending traffic to VCO and not receiving...They get me fine on whatever HF working freq I'm using as I choose carefully. After I can't hear VCO on 446kHz any more, I put my tfc on INMARSAT-A at high cost. I'll be damned if I'll send tfc in Voice. I've never done it in 30 years and I won't degrade myself at this late stage.

I do maintain CW service though even after I can't

work VCO any longer by sending all my Weather Observations (OBS), the bathythermograph observations (BATHY) and our ship movement report messages to the US Coast Guard (AMVER) by using one of the few remaining US commercial marine radio stations, usually Global Radio Network which, from Mobile (Ala.) Radio/WLO, controls two other stations, i.e. Tuckerton (N.J.) Radio/WSC and Seattle (Wash.) Radio/KLB. I can also use the other company in the States which controls from San Francisco Radio/KFS three other stations,

i.e. San Francisco Radio/KPH, Slidell (La.) Radio/WNU and WCC (formerly located at Cape Cod but now located at Slidell also). And on very rare occasions, I will send an OBS or AMVER to Bermuda Harbour Radio/ZBM or Nassau Radio/C6N on the MF CW band after calling them on 500kHz, if in range. Unfortunately, both stations display extremely poor watchkeeping on 500kHz. In fact, I think that C6N doesn't even have an antenna connected to their receiver! ZBM appears to have the same problem. I know for a fact that at ZBM, there are a couple of oprs who HATE CW... (simply because they could never handle it properly).

Let me tell you a little bit about myself. I'm 51, divorced, father of two (Skylar, 20 and Evangeline, 12) children who are living with me in Windsor and I am working for the Dept. of National Defense of Canada as a civilian Gov't Ship Officer on the Canadian Navy's only civilian-manned deep-sea vessel. My regular ship (they are both research-vessels) is CFAV "Quest"/CZDO, which is in a 2-year mid-life refit in Newfoundland, is the better of the two but had we not had this (formerly) West Coast-based vessel handed over to us when the Federal Gov't closed the research opns of the Navy in the Pacific, we (the ship's complement) probably would have been laid off for 2 years! (Not a good prospect).

I started as a Radio Officer in Dec 1967 on an old tramp-ship called S/S "Cabahawk"/ZIOX which took me from Montreal to Honolulu. Twenty-three ships followed over the 30 years and this includes about 8 years ashore, most of these spent working at combined marine/aeradio stations (Vancouver RadiolVAI and Prince Rupert Radio/VAJ) and purely marine stns (Grindstone Radio/VCN and Halifax Radio/VCS where I spent 5 years...at the peak of CW comms in the late '70s and very early '805). I hold a First Class Certificate of Proficiency in Radio-telegraphy. Lately I've had to take that stupid 2-week GMDSS (Global

Maritime Distress & Safety System) operator course which led to an "instant" radio-operator certificate which all ships' Mates are proud in obtaining as they can now claim that they know just as much in marine radio-communications as any Radio Officer does. Sad, very sad, but Mates are like that!

I'm including 2 or 3 little notes re. CW. You'll see that the Canadian Gov't is one of the worst administrations in the world with regards to Morse comms, the Gov't having made its mind up to eliminate it any way they can and this, as long ago as when I started my career! Every cutback, they have always done in the most secretive way possible. Of course, how could the Canadian Gov't show off to the rest of the world if they didn't push high tech in order to benefit Canadian electronics companies, in addition to subsidizing these heavily?? It doesn't look good in the eyes of someone you want to impress by high tech comms equip if some of your own ships still use "antiquated" Morse equipment, does it?

Well, a lot of people (including the Navy) have tried in many ways to shut me down insofar as Morse is concerned, but none has succeeded yet. In fact, when I joined CYWK, there was no Morse facilities onboard except a terrible HF system which is not really designed for CW work but can be used if one is willing to put up with umpteen problems relating to actual working (e.g. no possibility of QSK which makes efficient working impossible). So I had hidden two transmitters (one MF, one HF) over the years (right from under the Navy's eyes), keeping them in a closet on CZDO.

When I joined CYWK last February (1997), I installed (not without many structural problems to conquer) the two and now am running a full MF/HF CW service as all ships should. I keep quiet about it, but I'm sure someone in the Navy must suspect that I am CW-capable as I never ever send the Navy any traffic directly as they can only offer Voice (SSB) comms, yet they get from VCO my daily tfc. "How does VCO get our own CYWK's tfc???" they must question themselves.

I send all to VCO (free-of-charge as they are Gov't-operated and we are also Gov't) in CW and they, in turn, send it down the line on FAX to the Naval Radio Station at MillCove (South of Halifax) (callsign: CFH) for the latter to disseminate it by putting it on their router system which reaches all Naval addressees indicated on the message. The only problem is when CFH has tfc for me! They send a tfc list

on 6694kHz SSB on the hour to which I listen when on watch. If they have tf c for me, I call them in Voice on that freq and they (usually) ask me to see them on FAX via satellite (INMARSAT-A) as they are no more keen than I am to send the message by Voice (actually, if it had been left to the Navy oprs as to whether or not to keep CW in service instead of some Commander somewhere at headquarters who is totally out of touch with reality, I probably would still today have a CW (blind) best from CFH on which to copy my shoreto-ship tfc.).

This has been a very frustrating situation over the years. I dearly love Morse and will use it for as long as I can. Who knows? I may be the very last guy to send a message in Morse in Marine communications in the Atlantic one day. I hope not, though: my wish is for other (younger) Radio Officers to keep it going for as long as THEY can after I retire.

If anyone would be interested in monitoring CW transmissions from CYWK handling regular comms with WSC or WLO, I usually call on 8368 or 8367.5 at about 1210Z and 2310z daily, listening to WLO or WSC on their working freg (WLO = 8472, WSC = 8680) and then move off to my working freq (either 8352 or 8375.5). At 1810Z, at least where we are now (Bahamas area), I call on 12552 or 12551.5, listening to WLO on 12704.5 or WSC on 12879.5. After they answer me, I shift to 12464 or 12425. At those times, I'm sending the WX OBS I've just taken and coded myself. The OBS could also be followed by a BATHY or even an AMVER message. This is going to happen from about April 17 until about May 16th when I would start working VCO as we get closer and closer to Nova Scotia. Off the Eastern Seaboard between Charleston and Halifax, I'm likely to use 6mHz and 8mHz with WSC rather than 8mHz and 12mHz with WLO (same opr handling both transmitter sites, he just answers ships using one call-sign or the other, i.e. whichever one was picked by the ship). If I use 6mHz, then I'll call either on 6276 or 6278.5 and listen to WSC on 6484.5 (altho the opr will key all of WSC's HF TXs simultaneously when answering the ship). Again I would do this at the times mentioned earlier.

If you get a chance please inform Dick Berry K8UGL of Columbus Ohio that his initiative paid off when he sent me an application for FISTS. 73 for now, Paul

'Another Licensing Perspective by Vance N8UGV

When I first entered the hobby of amateur radio as a no-code tech, I would hear higher classed hams talking about the "no-good no-codes." In fact, I was told on the air by one ham who refused to give his call sign, to "Go back to CB!". It was a shock to me that an "Elmer", or at the very least someone who should know better, would put down a new ham but also break the law by not identifying. It set my respect of more experienced hams back about four steps. I was very frustrated but eventually upgraded to Advanced. I tried to get my speed up for Extra but thought it impossible - too hard even with the help of some very understanding Extras. So I gave up trying.

After 3 years away from CW and 2 years off HF altogether I got back on the air last September. I made myself operate CW, 3 CW contacts for every SSB contact. Then I decided to try to get my WAS 40m CW certificate and as a result fell in love with CW. I am not a CW "elitist" but operate CW a vast majority of the time. In November I achieved Extra and STILL respect Tech-lights but do everything I can to encourage them to upgrade. It was so "difficult" to get my speed up I though I would never make Extra.

To newer hams reading this - it is NOT impossible nor too "difficult". Let's put this into perspective. Below is a letter I received from a Czech ham, Zdenek, OK1FGF, I met on 15m CW this past January. We have stayed in contact via e-mail and are waiting for conditions to improve to continue QSO's on CW. I asked him what it took to obtain a license in the Czech Republic.

Read this and you might rethink how difficult it really is to get a license in America. The content of his letter is unchanged but I did "translate" parts of the letter because his English is quite broken.

"Hello Vance Thank you for the e-mail. I am happy that in today's era that somebody prefers CW. To my operations I devote a majority of time to CW. For me CW has magic. It is a dimension beyond SSB. I feel that I am in another world when I hear a CW signal on the set.

Now to your inquiry. Czech has 4 amateur radio classes. They are Class A, Class B, Class C, and Class D. Class A is the highest class and can operate all modes on HF and UHF with a power output of 500 watts. Class B is the same but power is limited to 300 watts. Class C is dull SSB and only 100 watts. Class D may only operate UHF and do not need to know CW.

A'Class A licensee may seek to upgrade to use 1500 watts. Trial for license is necessary, put together before committee buro (ministry to the right and connection - inspectorship radio communication). [That was a direct quote] The test is perhaps 400 questions. [He used "400 interrogation"] Further practical CW test from Class C and Class D to upgrade. Anyone interested about ham radio may apply ["plea" was used here] to first obtain a Class D or C. After 1 year of practice a ham may seek to upgrade into a higher class. Class A must document a minimum of 2 years practice and must have made at least 3000 OSO's. noncontest or repeaters. At once A is obliged document confirmation of 200 Country DXCC. [I'm not sure what that meant] I'm applying this year for a Class A license and my call will change from OK1FGF to OK1GF.

It would be a poor choice to pull down CW, that with acts about no-perspective operation. [again, not sure what he meant] They endeavor to eliminate CW for trial of license. Many exist, friend, who support CW. It'd was meanwhile all. [what?] Once more thank you for your e-mail and I look forward to further. Maybe we can arrange a sked. Let me know. Take care and God Bless! Zdenek OK1FGF"

So what do you think now? We really do have it easy off here in the USA. We are able to go from Tech-light to Extra in a single sitting. No, he didn't mention how fast they had to copy but he did say 3000 noncontest or repeater contacts, and 2 years minimum practice. 3000 contacts? I would have given up before I started. So next time you hear someone complaining that the requirements to upgrade are too difficult, please share with them this story but RE-SPECT THEIR OPINION. They may have no desire to learn CW. As big a shame as that would be we still live in a free country. I could only hope it might give them another perspective on the true ease we have here in America, especially with regard to ham radio.

From Robert KB7AQD, #3478: With the improving solar cycle, I still am surprised at the utter lack of activity from 28525-29000 kHz, even during contests. Have some ideas for some FISTS CW center of operations:

28558 28658 28758 28858 28958 kHz

Set up your automatic keyers to send a CQ call on any of these frequencies, and see if any other hams will respond. On paper, this would be a primary SSB range — if ANYONE bothered to use it. We CW ops need to do something about it, or the pirates will use the subbands we hams choose to ignore.

Working with Plexiglass Hint: Ed W2BVJK #2495, sends along this tip - Use any light oil such as 3 in 1, sewing machine oils, etc. Put some oil on spot to be drilled. DO NOT try to fly through the material because of using the oil. GO SLOW, just a few turns at a time. When finished you should have a clean hole with no cracks or fractures. With this method you can use regular drill bits. It works for me - Happy Drilling!

Ben NOSOT #3086 sends in his renewal with the note to say that all he hears about FISTS on the air is very complimentary, like "best club on the air" and "wish I'd joined sooner". Ben is VA disabled and on oxygen 24 hours a day, but between the Bible and using CW, he's quite content. New Straight Key From G4ZPY

From Gordon G4ZPY: "This one is "Big Brother" to the "Baby". We have had many requests for an intermediate size key for Portable work, so we thought that it was about time that we catered for the Straight Key Buffs.

The Base is made from Black Plastic, 3" x 2" x 1/2" with Baize underneath it. The Key arm is 3/8 " square Brass x 3" long, and mounted in a "U" shaped Yoke. Adjustable Contact has a silver tip, and is locked in position with a "thumb wheel". The Contact has 40 threads to the inch, so the adjustment is very fine. Spring adjustment is virtually the same as our normal size key. It can be purchased in either Polished Brass or Nickel Plated finish. Price for the Brass £40. - Nickel £45 Post to U.S. £5.

The knob on it is Brass, but insulated from the key arm. We have only made the prototype so far, but we are very pleased with it. Best Regards, Gordon.

Russian Paddle/Keyer Available

Milestone Technologies is now distributing the Key-8 paddle/keyer made by ElectroInstrument, a former Soviet Military contractor specializing in aerospace equipment and electronics.

The body of the Key-8 is perfectly polished chrome and the base plate is made from 3/8" solid brass and weighs almost three and a half pounds. Paddle tension and spacing are independently adjustable. There is a small amount of "tactile feedback" which makes it feel a bit like a magnetic paddle, but it's mechanical. The contacts are silver.

The built-in electronic keyer is not iambic, squeezing both paddles will result in a string of either dits or dahs, not alternating dits and dahs. Instructions for bypassing the keyer are provided (in English) so the paddle can be used with an external keyer, or the built-in keyer can be replaced with an iambic one. A sidetone oscillator is included and the speed is set from a knob on the top of the body. Speed range is 5-50 WPM. Output keying is by means of an internal metal thread relay, so the key line is electrically isolated from the keyer and you don't have to worry about polarity or voltage (within specified limits). All connections to the keyer are by way of a 5-pin DIN plug

Acute-Care and Code

It is time to raise an important issue: use of Morse code in acute care situations. As the World War II generation ages, and as Morse code is used more and more as an aid for the disabled, there is a small but significant population that knows code who are presenting to acute care facilities in conditions where their normal communication is impaired. I would like to suggest several simple steps that could enable Morse code to be used more often (and more effectively) in these situations. These are:

- 1. Develop a Morse code knowledge emergency ID wallet card, with an explanation and code chart, and distribute it via Morse 2000, ARRL, and other Morse-interested organizations. (See suggested version below.)
- 2. Develop a page on Morse code use to be incorporated in standard emergency room manuals.
- 3. Develop a "Morse code in the E.R." familiarization video training tape oriented to emergency room professionals. Preferably have it certified for continuing education credits. The intent would not be to get ER personnel to memorize the code, but to know how to recognize that a patient might know Morse code, where to find a Morse code translator, and how to use code to communicate with the patient using a Morse code chart (and where to find the chart).
- 4. Encourage incorporation of Morse code information in living wills of people who know the code. For example, my living will contains the following language: "I am familiar with the Morse code, and my attorney should use a person knowledgeable in the Morse code as evidenced by a current amateur or commercial FCC license that includes a code element to try to communicate with me."

I hesitate to condemn this - if members are keen on getting the last few entries for their Platinum etc., then this is fair enough but do please guard against refusing to work non members. This is not an elite club. Our aim should be to foster the use of CW and not to stifle it so in this sense, the non member is just as important as members. I have never heard anyone refuse to work such a station incidentally, and to my knowledge none have been reported here. I mention this only to steer you away from such a temptation should it present itself even if you are seeking that last number on your claim form. Hi.

INFO REQUIRED

Dear Geo.

Thanks for the surprise call last night-and apologies for not staying on too long but I was starting to flag a little!! You were a good 589 down here, despite only using a mag loop. I was using an Icom IC725, (100w), but I do have an interesting CW only tx from the 1960's. It is a MK234, made by the diplomatic wireless service and used by British Embassies abroad as a backup tx. It runs about 40W o/p from a single 6146, and Xtal conrolled. Thanks to various readers of "Radio Bygones", I managed to get a full manual and it is now back to 100% working. I also use, with both rigs, the Keying Unit Type 949 made by Eddystone- a 19 inch rack affair with all transistor logic (OC206 bistables!). I would be delighted to know if any FISTS members have any information about this unit, or indeed any recollection of using a MK234. I am not sure what receiver it was used with. I myself use my RA17 to be authentic!. Keeping both units on the same QRG reminds me what a real radio ops job was, keeps me busy on Sunday afternoons when the bands are not so much of a rat race except during contests of course. Thanks again, keep up the good work and HPE CUAGN. 73.Rob G4JNA.

SOUNDFIELD STEREO ADAPTOR

On reading the item in last month's Keynote concerning the 'stereo filter', Chris, G3TUX sent me the above item for assessment.

The idea I gather, is to create a pseudo stereo effect by imposing delays on the incoming signals and causing the result to be diverted to either left or right of a pair of stereo headphones. The effect is such that a signal will appear to be centred between your ears or offset either left or right dependent upon the pitch. With more than one signal being input, it is possible to concentrate on one particular signal by virtue of its apparent location. Actually, all this is far more difficult to describe than to experience but you can virtually "see" the signals and watch them shift from ear to ear depending on the direction you are tuning.

Having used the original design by Dud Charman, I am in the happy position of being able to do a fair comparison and I must start out by saying that whilst basically the effect is the same, the performance is far different.

Dud's original permitted you to alter the apparent shift and even to apply the input solely to one side of the headphones. The Soundfield does not have this facility and I soon realised why. There are two quite sharp filters which can be chosen from the front panel. One of 800Hz and the t'other of 1000Hz and any signal corresponding the the chosen centre frequency is automatically centred. Signals within the passband but falling outside this centre frequency are still evident but reside either left or right of centre.

My rig does not sport a 1KHz CW filter so I had to switch to 2KHz and mess around with the bandwidth control a little to simulate this value. I picked up a S3 signal, centred it at 800Hz and changed the centre frequency to 1000Hz which caused it's apparent position in space to shift to the right phone. Tuning this to the centre frequency immediately caused the signal to appear directly in front of me and the gain offered by the AF filter gave it quite a fair boost. Switching the adapter out (a front panel push button permits this) produced a completely different sound. Flat with noise. Back to the adapter and 800Hz and a touch on the tuning placed the signal at centre and at a frequency more to my liking.

There is a measure of echo particularly with strong signals which can easily be ignored unless you choose to reduce the gain in which case it is no longer apparent. This however does appear on keying if your side tone like mine is of a fixed amplitude. With the pump handle, it makes not one jot of difference but I found

myself producing some pretty gawky CW until the volume of the keyers' side tone output was stronger than that appearing in the phones.

The front-panel control for F(ast) or S(low) has little effect and even with station steaming along at some 40wpm, the slow position still left them readable. Even with the sharp filtering fitted to the FT1000MP in circuit, the sound was still vastly different than straight through. All I can tell you folks is that if you try this box of tricks, Morse will never again sound the same without it. Incidentally, although the gadget is inscribed "adaptor", my spelling checker threw this out but happily accepted "adapter".

AWARDS

Initially, we had some problems with claims for the Platinum Award when some members had not been given the correct Century Award number. Bob supplies numbers on request from his opposite number in the US but a period of one-way communication seems to have resulted in a few mix-ups. These anomalies have now been ironed out but Bob will probably have to take earlier errors into account for a while. Whilst we are not playing "awkward", numbers quoted will be carefully checked by Bob to ensure that they tally. The first Platinum threw up several incorrect numbers at least one of which was incorrectly supplied by the holder. Others could be ascribed to inaccurate reading or just plain typos. There was quite a lot of back and forth e-mailing over this one before Bob finally got everything sorted out but we now have a dedicated database for awards which is shared by both Bob and myself so all should be reasonably plain sailing henceforth.

Another query concerns the Century award and club stations. If you work a club station, you may claim three points for the contact and will be given a number which will correspond to the member operating the station at that time. If the same member then turns up with another club call, forget it. You have already claimed that number. This works in exactly the same way as with US members who take out vanity calls. You have to be wary of this because you may not know at the time that you have already claimed that same number under a different call. Bob however will disallow this entry. The easiest way to avoid this trap is to keep a check sheet showing number v call and then cross refer the number. If it shows up, then your contact is not valid as a point.

With the Platinum, you are expected to disregard any claims made under either Century or Gold and start again. We do not propose that any contacts made for these awards should not be claimed again. If you have already claimed the member for Century or Gold (or even Diamond) then a fresh contact date would be anticipated.

Hope this has cleared up any nagging questions. Hi.

INDECENT LANGUAGE

One of the goals FISTS member Joe Falcone N8TI has during his term as ARRL Great Lakes Director is to take those who use indecent language off the amateur bands. Joe is looking for tape recordings of alleged offenders to use as proof to the FCC that the problem is nationwide. The tapes have to be of good quality and clearly demonstrate that a violation has taken place. The best way to do this is make a direct connection between your receiver and the tape recorder. Send the tape to Joe Falcone, 9614 Arden Ave, Livonia MI 48150. Be sure to include information about the transmission - frequency, time, date along with your name and any information you may have of the alleged offender.

This may at first appear to have nothing whatsoever to do with UK or EU but we are also subject to this unfortunate craze which appears to be creeping into transmission by amateurs in the States. I have yet to confirm that the RSGB is prepared to take some action against UK stations found guilty of using such objectionable terminology. My suggestion for the moment is that such tape recordings be forwarded to whichever National Society you subscribe to and ask what action they are able or propose to take.

As I mentioned last month, comments of political, ethnic or religious nature are surely unacceptable and should be treated in the same way as bad language. At the present moment, the amateur bands are relatively 'clean' but I am certain that our security of tenure demands that they should be 'squeaky' cleam.

ODDS 'N ENDS

AWARDS

During January, we issued a further GOLD award (Nr. 010) to N4RSD together with Platinums (001 and 002) to KC5VJU and AC6TO. We actually skipped a number here because Gold number 009 was inadvertently allocated to N9NVV who submitted the

claim on behalf of N4RSD but this was not discovered until after the Certificate had been despatched so will be corrected with the next award.

CONGESTION ON 14058

I have a suggestion that QSOs be restricted - presumably in order to clear the frequency for others but this is a long way from practical. Remember that our recommended QRG of 14058 represents nothing more than a starting point. If it is QRL, just drop down until you find a clear spot. Most members will (as I do myself) generally trawl the spectrum from 14058 plus down to 14052 plus. 14052 is the same "starting point" for the RNARS and, witnessing our downwards migration in busy conditions they will no doubt adopt the same tack.

SUBS

A number of you have voiced the opinion that the subs should be increased to keep pace with rising costs not only of postal rates but also of materials. Quite honestly, I am loathe to do this because of the number of members who are on a fixed income. We already receive many donations over and above the subscription level and rather than impose a blanket increase of subs, I would prefer that those who wish (and are able) to do so, continue to add a little extra. At the AGM therefore, I shall be again proposing no increase in the present subscription rates.

NOVICE ROUNDUP

An e-mail from Nancy reminded me that the Novice Roundup was running the weekend of Feb 13 and could I spare a little time to make the club call available on these bands. Unfortunately, 20M is not available to the Novices and the only other band practical was 15m which was barely open to Europe. Members will no doubt be aware that since the ARRL abandoned this event, it has been maintained by the US FISTS contingent and I wish them much success.

LISTING ON DISC

There is a little confusion here. Let me clarify that the 'listing' is exactly that. It is an up-to-date list of ALL members ordered on both call and number and in both ASCII and dBase form. The Log is a different thing altogether and applies to those who are running my logging system. Just a reminder also that those of you with computers can employ just about any spread sheet from the cheapest to the most elaborate, to maintain a log for Century and other claims purposes. You do not need the sophistication of a full

blown relational database.
