#### QUESTIONS

Periodically I get letters with questions about the terms and abbreviations used in the Keynote. They were starting to pile up so I thought I would take a minute and see if I can shed some light on them. Some I don't have the answer to, so if anyone can help, drop me a line. Here goes:

What is Rad Com? This is a British magazine called Radio Communications. It's not devoted totally to ham radio, but it's about the closest they have to CQ across the Pond. I've seen their booth at the Dayton Hamvention so I know subscriptions are available to NA but I don't have any info about it.

What does VMT mean? Geo uses this a lot. It stands for Very Many Thanks.

What does ARF mean? Pete K8OUA signs his traffic column off with "ARF from the traffic hound". This is just a "funny" - he's barking, which is what a hound does, traffic or rabbit.

Who is GX0IPX/P? GX0IPX is a British issued club callsign for FISTS. Geo can use it without a suffix because it is issued in his name. A British FISTS member may use the callsign (in England) with a " /P " meaning "portable". We cannot use the callsign here, even tho we are FISTS members because it's against FCC regulations.

Do we have a US/Canadian Club Call? No. There has been some discussion about applying for one, but I really don't think it would be practical. With the NA members numbering over 500 already, it would be very difficult to keep track of who is using it...and I think it might get out of hand. You are welcome to write and try to change my mind though!

Is there a code character for < or > (less than or greater than) or ! (exclamation point)? I don't know of any, does anyone know one?

What does EMC stand for? I don't know this one either.

In the Oct issue of page 4 - top left of page I typed in the letter "U" instead of "TU" which stands for Thank You. This was a typo and not a new appreviation! The same thing probably goes for QRF, which was probably a typo for Petes ARF or QLF, which is a "joke" meaning sending with your left foot, when someone is sending hard to copy code.

## What's The Secret?

Why are there so many FISTS CW CLUB members in Southwest Washington State? I am not sure that you can put your finger on one thing that is the "secret". Around the time the 1400 numbers started up I happened to read a message addressed to ALLUSA on packet. It was placed there by Joe, AA8HV, and told about FISTS. In that I liked CW, I responded to his message, received an application, and joined FISTS with the number 1402. When I received a membership list I was amazed that I was the only FIST then registered in the whole State of Washington. The West Coast had not awakened yet!

A little later I mentioned FISTS to my good friend, Stu, K7WF, who is and always has been an avid CW operator. I think when Stu, being originally from GW land, saw all of those "G" calls on the list coupled with his love of CW, he could hardly wait for his number to be issued. He was the second on the list from Washington State. From there, we continued to promote CW and FISTS membership here among our Ham friends most of whom are members of our local club, the Lower Columbia Amateur Radio Association, W7DG. We also promoted FISTS among many of our CW contacts across the country.

One morning, down at the local watering hole, we were talking over coffee, and got the idea to pick up an old unused call, WA7YYY, which many years ago was a radio club here. The call had been kept licensed. So we went to the trustee and told her of our idea for a FISTS club here in Cowlitz County. She had been holding it for these many years for someone who might want to form a group. Therefore the Cowlitz FISTS Amateur Radio Club was born, licensed in September, and officially chartered October 12, 1995, with Randy, NU7D, as trustee and a membership of 18. We adopted the three basic aims of FISTS, (1) To further the use of Morse Code on the bands, (2) To encourage the newcomer to the mode., and (3) To engender friendships within the membership. Keep those in mind and you will grow from there, no question about it!

As a result of our efforts, several local Hams got excited again about CW. They had not even been on the air for six to eight years. Now they are active again and having fun. Two or three with tech licenses are working on their code, anxious to upgrade and get on the air using their FISTS numbers. There are no extraordinary plans for the future of the club, but who knows? We will pass the log book and license around for each

member to use so the club call will be on the air. We will try to be on during some of the contests, sprints, etc. We are not looking to take people away from W7DG, as far as operating, just to enhance it and have FUN.

If you have a QSO with an operator from WA7YYY, please QSL via our FISTS buro. Most of our members will be using the buro individually also, so send your cards there to John, N8FU, and keep some SASE's with him for your mail also.

The secret? Promote CW, talk it up, have FUN with CW. You will make many new friends as we have. (Look for at least four of us at Dayton in 1996, we are saving the egg money to pay our way to the big city!) We are excited about FISTS!

## 1996 Novice RoundUp

Are you missing the NR? Well, here is another one for you to try. FISTS CW Club is sponsoring the first annual FISTS Novice Roundup.

When — 1600 UTC Saturday February 24, 1996 till 2400 UTC Sunday March 3, 1996.

Object — Novices and Techs exchange information with any other stations, General class licensees and up exchange information only with Novices/Techs. Exchange — Send signal report, state/province/DX country, and FISTS number (if FISTS member) or power output (if not FISTS member). Novices and Techs must sign /N or /T to indicate their license status.

QSO points — 1 point for each complete phone contact; 2 points for each complete packet contact; 3 points for each complete CW contact. Add one point per QSO if contact is with a FISTS CW Club member (indicate FISTS number in log). Work stations only once per band per mode. Multipliers — each state/province/DX country counts as one multiplier (no matter how many times it is worked). Final Score — multiply number of QSO points by number of multipliers.

Send logs (paper logs only, please) showing call of station worked and all exchange information to Peter Kozup, K8OUA, 5115 N. Park Ave., Warren, OH 44481, postmarked no later than April 9, 1996. Results will be posted in the FISTS Keynote newsletter, or include SASE for listing of results by mail.

We have since found out that a QRP group is having a NR in January, we wish them the best of luck and hope you will participate in that one as well. Next year we will try and co-ordinate efforts so we don't have the duplication of contests...or maybe it will turn out to be a Good Thing to have TWO NR's...at least Novice/Techs can't complain there is nothing on the air for them!

#### MFJ POCKET MORSE TUTOR Model MFJ-411

User Report from Mike Greenfield N9JIY
This is a little carry-around gadget designed to help
folks learn CW. Size is approx. 3.5" x 5.5" x 1.25". It
might weigh a pound. In its' black-painted case of
16ga sheet aluminum it looks nearly bulletproof!
The Tutor has several user-selectable options:
CHARACTER SETS C1 through C7 - C1 through C4
break the alphabet into 4 letter groups. C1 is EISHTMO, etc. C5 and C6 are numbers. C7 is the common
prosigns. This is just for beginners.

ADVANCED OPTIONS - Lets you pick just letters (all 26), just numbers, just prosigns, or letters/numbers/ prosigns combined. These are sent at random. Also offered are common words, and simulated QSOs.

You pick Normal/Farnsworth spacing, length of character groups and sending speed. You'll hear 5 character only, random or repeat the series you just heard. 6 LEDs and a 2-character display show what you've selected. There's an off/on button and 2 other buttons that 'you "click" separately or simultaneously to operate the device. Instructions are silkscreened on the front of it, so operation is very easy.

The Tutor uses a single 9V battery. It has a coaxial plug for external 12V, and a 1/8" stereo earphone jack.

Once you've made your operating choices, you "double click" to "GO", see a 5-second countdown on the display, and start to hear CW. The LEDs and display turn off automatically to save battery power. In short, it would be a well designed single-purpose device typical of MFJ - EXCEPT for four things:

1/ IMPORTANT - in Advanced Options-Letters/ Numbers/Prosigns mode, you hear common prosigns, plus 11 or 12 that are almost NEVER heard on the air. When did you last hear a dollar sign, a left parentheses or start-of-paragraph character??? This is very confusing! It should be the single most useful option. Instead it's almost useless to me!

2/ Belt Clip - The Tutor begs to be carried around like a portable tape player, but there's no belt clip or case provided to do so. You'll have to figure something on your own.

3/ Battery Changing - You have to have a Phillips head screwdriver! None of the little snap doors we've come to expect.

4/ Price - Most places you'll have to shell out about \$80 to walk home with the Tutor. That's a little stiff in light of 1/, 2/, and 3/ above.

## Open Letter to DX FISTS

Most US hams, even many DX-ers, know very little about foreign hams. Most DX contacts are name-report-73 affairs. Yet, I believe most US hams (such as myself) as curious about these fellow hams, especially those whose culture differs most from that of the US. Europeans, such as English, French, Polish, German are more familiar since a great number of US people are their direct descendants; but the culture of China, India, Russia and Japan etc. are less familiar. It is relatively recently that these countries have been open to wide cultural and business exchanges.

My idea is to increase the understanding and empathy of FISTS members by publishing a series of articles about foreign hams in the Keynote. To do this, the cooperation of DX hams and those who have visited, perhaps operated from, these countries would be essential.

If you don't have the time to write the article yourself, try providing the raw material. In odd moments of your spare time, jot down your thoughts on any piece of paper handy and mail it, or Email it to me.

Items of interest might be: How is ham radio conducted and restricted in the country you are familiar with? Is phone or CW mostly used? How are the language symbols sent in CW? Is US language used much or at all, or only for DX? Do they have radio clubs like we do? Do they publish newsletters? Are there any International clubs? What are their ham exams like, code, technical requirements? Frequencies allowed? Is equipment readily available to Japanese hams at a low cost (where most of it is made) or are the prices kept artificially high? Are their shacks are "messy" as ours?? Do they collect QSLs?

I could go on and on, but I think you see what I'm driving at. Does anyone else think this would be of interest? Can you think of a better approach to achieving closer relationships among FISTS members?

I hope Geo picks up on this and includes an invitation to our DX FISTS to send info along to me, along with a photograph for our FISTS Photobook. If a DX member sends in a photo, I'll send him a copy of the Photobook.

## ODDS N' ENDS

Found Nigel GORWQ the t'other day operating from the Kings Lynn club station (G3XYZ) with a dust-ridden, corroded and mis-aligned key. It's the only key available here explained Nigel; both bearing caps were split and the front of the shaft was fitted with a paper shim and when asked where the real club key was, he was told it was only used for cw practice.

GOHIN responded to last months request for info on bug keys by Yuzuru AA1JA which has been forwarded via Nancy. There was more to come as Chris (G3TUX) waded in with more pages from "Keys, Keys, Keys". This particular item drew attention to what every would be bug user should know but few indeed do: It is a

mechanical device and thus cannot be treated in the same way as paddles on electronic keyers.

Too many try to set the thing up with as small a movement as possible on paddle. There must be a reasonable gap not least to permit the weight and "U" spring to do their job but also to impart the "feel" which is highly desirable. I have heard old sweats rattling along at 40wpm plus but since you have to make your own dashes, you need to be a real expert to send good code at such a rate of knots.

Also, do please remember to check on the hour (or even the half hour if possible) and a receiver with wide bandpass on around 14057 is a good thing for those who have other chores to do whilst just listening.

NOTE: The italics and underlining are my addition, as I frequently get asked about where to find FISTS and what to do if the .058 frequencies are busy. I'm glad Geo mentioned that listening with a wide bandpass is important also. Too many have narrow filters on and you miss it if someone comes back to your CQ FISTS a little bit off frequency. It's hard to zerobeat a CQ sometimes, so listen leniently after your CQ FISTS!! de Nancy

## FRACTURED ENGLISH

The only point in its operation is that a proficiency of the operation can be observed in dividing a dot signal made out successfully according to a necessary number and in the construction of a signal smoothly to combine with a dash signal.
