

FREQUENTLY ASKED OUESTIONS - PLEASE READ

HOW DO I JOIN? Membership is open to all people interested in Morse code, irrespective of their speed and ability. An application form is not necessary to join, but it gives us a more complete picture of our membership. You can download a North American membership application on the FISTS web page: http://www.fists.org. An application can be mailed to you. Send a message Jim Ranieri, AA9LS, aa9ls@turbotoads.com and he will email it to you, or mail an SASE to him at 33778 Rebecca Rd, Kingston IL 60145 and Jim will send you an application via return postal mail. To join without an application, send your name, call, and mailing address with your membership fee to Nancy WZ8C, PO Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440 (checks payable to FISTS). To join using Paypal (www.paypal.com), send the funds to fists@tir.com. In the comments box, type NEW MEMBERSHIP, your callsign, name and mailing address if different from your Paypal address

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST? Subscriptions are \$15.00/year; Under 17= FREE; College students = \$10. Family members may join FISTS at no extra charge-only one newsletter is mailed per household. Please make checks paypable to FISTS CW Club and send to FISTS, PO Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440. Do not send FISTS correspondence to Nancy WZ8C's callbook address. Checks can take 6-8 weeks to clear from the day received. Nancy processes them, then takes them to the bookkeeper. The bookkeeper enters them into the "official books", then takes them to the bank. Depending on schedules that month, it can take 6-8 weeks. It doesn't take 8 weeks to get your number, it just may take that long for your check to clear.

HOW DO I JOIN USING MY PAYPAL ACCOUNT? North American FISTS accepts PAYPAL (http://www.paypal.com). Address your PAYPAL payment to FISTS@TIR.COM To join via Paypal, type "New Membership" in the Paypal Comments Box, your name (if different from the name on your Paypal account), callsign, and mailing address.

HOW DO I KNOW WHEN TO RENEW? A FISTS volunteer sends out renewal postcards, but if you renew prior to your renewal month it will save postage and printing costs as well as volunteer time. Your renewal date is on your Keynote mailing label in the form of year, month, date. For example 2005/4/4 would be a renewal date April 2005. The date of the month is meaningless, but the computer program requires a date, so generally the date of the month is the same as the month. 2005/12/12; 2006/5/5 etc,

HOW DO I RENEW? To renew, send \$15 to Nancy WZ8C (checks paypable to FISTS) at FISTS, PO Box 47 Hadley MI 48440.

HOW DO I RENEW WITH PAYPAL? If you have a Paypal account, send the funds to fists@tir.com; put "RENEWAL" in the Comment Box, along with your callsign.

MAY I RENEW FOR MORE THAN ONE YEAR AT A TIME? Yes! You may renew for as many years at a time as you like, but there is not a 'quantity' discount.

MY MEMBERSHIP LAPSED, CAN I GET MY OLD NUMBER BACK? Yes. Numbers are not reassigned. If you have had a number in the past, let Nancy know at the time of your renewal. so she can 'reactivate' it

WHERE DO I MAILA DX APPLICATION OR RENEWAL? ZL,VK applications are go to Ralph Sutton, ZL2AOH at 12C Herbert Gardens, 186 The Terrace, Wellington 6001, New Zealand. HOW DO I GET A NUMBER FOR MY LOCAL CLUB? Clubs with FCC call signs may be assigned a FISTS number at no charge providing there is at least one FISTS member in good standing in the local club. These clubs are not legally affiliated with FISTS, nor does FISTS have anything to do with how the club is run, etc. It just means the club has a FISTS number and is worth three points toward awards. If the club wants a newsletter, there is a \$15 a year charge. To defray cost, please enclose \$1 if he club wants a membership certificate and \$3 for award certificates.

HOW DO I UPDATE MY ADDRESS or CALL SIGN ON THE FISTS DATABASE? Send corrections or changes to Nancy Kott, WZ8C, at FISTS, P. O. Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440 or email to nancy@tir.com. Please send labels with your corrections to the FISTS QSL Bureau so the bureau workers don't have to change all your SASEs by hand.

HOW DO I GET AN UP-TO-DATE MEMBER LIST? Send a SASE with \$2.00 (US) to Ed N7CFA 2628 Lilac Street, Longview, WA 98632. Lists are available on the FISTS Web page. The search engine feature on the web page is updated more frequently than the text list on the web page.

HOW DO I GET ON THE FISTS EMAIL LIST? To receive periodic official Email updates, send your Email address, call sign and FISTS number to Kathi Hilton. fistelist@comcast.net. If you put your email address on your application, it is automatically added to the list. Due to potential spam problems, the list is NOT given out to the membership and is NOT published on the web page. It is ONLY used to notify you of FISTS items of interest. If you want people to know your e-mail address, we recommend you include it in your listing on QRZ.com or Buckmaster lookup service.

Chuck Adams, K7QO,'s code course is a rousing success! Thousands of CDs distributed through FISTS as well as downloaded from his web page. Chuck has started a Book of the Month program - entire novels on CD (in mp3 format) in Morse code. I've been listening to the first book, and trust me, it's excellent code practice as well as being fun! It is a real workout for your brain, I can feel those neurons firing away as I listen. It is guaranteed to break you of the "writing everything down" habit and it perfect for practicing head copying. Here are the basics: The first book is "Dorothy and the Wizard in Oz" by L. Frank Baum. Each book is \$5 (MO) and you must include only a mailing label. Chuck furnishes the mailer, postage, disc, and a label on the disc. He has eliminated the:; "- and — and! from the text, so it will be an easy "read". These instructions are subject to change as this project evolves, books generally start at 20WPM, but for extra cost, lower speeds may be available. Many new hams are intrigued with the code after passing their 5WPM. But, like we all were (or are!) they are intimidated and nervous about getting on the air. They've had bad experiences on Field Day or other contests and QSO's where people won't QRS (slow down), and they are frustrated. We don't want that to happen! We want to encourage and nurture these new CW ops. Novice RoundUp used to be a good forum for this, but the Novice concept is obsolete. Therefore, "Get Your Feet Wet Weekend" will start 0000Z Sept 16 and run through 0000Z Sept 18. (This coincides with FISTS Anniversary) It is a whole weekend, so DX and and everyone will have plenty of time to participate for at least a few hours. The focus is on sending slowly and clearly and sending the exchange in order.

The rules: Operate under one of two categories for the entire event, Newcomer or Experienced. You can be licensed a long time but still be a Newcomer to CW or contesting. You're on the honor system: Choose whichever describes your ability. Call CQ FC. The Exchange: Callsign/N (newcomer) or Callsign/E (experienced), RST, Name, QTH, FISTS number or power, last two digits of the year licensed. Example: WZ8C/E, 599, Nancy, MI, 0379, 88. Count 2 points for working someone out of your category, 1 point for working someone in your category. Multipliers are number of stations worked that were licensed 2000-2005. Stations may be worked once per band for points, but their multiplier only counts once. No WARC bands. Contacts must be 2-way human-keyed CW (Iambics are fine - just no computerized or memory keyers). Send logs and score summary to Lee N7NU, at hallinl@lanecc.edu in ADIF format and "fists" in the subject line, or paper logs to Lee Hallin, 3413 Walton Lane, Eugene OR 97408.

Please spread the word about this contest - it will be a lot of fun, and give the new/slower hams a chance to get their feet wet in contesting. Now, on with your Keynote! 73 88 33 Nancy Kott WZ8C

Who are We, Really?

"Who are we, really" are we a group of ham operators who are hanging on to a mode of operation which technology has decided has out lived its usefulness, and because we had to learn code and we resist change; we try to keep it alive. Maybe it is because we are using the code as an avenue to collect awards, so we can keep up with other modes that offer similar awards there by keeping the mode active.

I have been a ham for 40+ years and most of my operating has been using the CW mode of operation. In recent years I have found a central theme that has appeared in the operation of CW, which I feel, will not help promote this mode of operation, but will help in its demise.

If we are going to keep CW alive, then we must adopt a different frame of reference than we have at present. We must begin to use the code as a second language, not as just a means to gain points and awards. I am not attacking those hams that are only interested in contesting or in acquiring points for awards, but CW can be so much more. I think we need to adopt the "rag chewing" idea that our SSB's have used for years. When I got started in this hobby back in the 1950's I could tune across the band and hear conversations about how to make a special pie, build a telescope, planting a garden, working on old cars, and everything else that you could think of. The end result was a closer bond between each other and some common interest that could be referred to in later contacts. In addition the code speed increases along with the level of understanding what was sent. Not to mention the sending ability would also improve.

Now this brings me to another issue that has been adopted in recent years that have also caused problems with new hams who want to learn and use That is the use of abbreviations, our club CW. mission statement is "accuracy transcends speed" and I think this is a very good description of what we are trying to do. Well let's take it one more step; lets reduce the number of abbreviations we use. This will give the new ham a chance to become part of the group and will help in the enjoyment of the hobby. As are mission statement says we don't need all those abbreviations in order to communicate. If you make a mistake in spelling a word. I would rather hear a series of "dits" indicating a mistake and the word spelled right than part of a word sent and that causes the other ham to try to second guess what was sent. The end result is no one understands anything and the contact becomes useless.

In summary, maybe fewer abbreviations and lets talk together, I think we will learn more about each other and have fun in the process. Then we have accomplished what we all want and that is to preserve Morse Code.


WG1L's Simple Paddles



Another Low Visual Antenna Suggestion

A low visual impact, efficient antenna is not necessarily an oxymoron. I have had excellent success using magnet wire and fishing line. Although this wire will kink easily, it is extremely strong and practically invisible.

For my first antenna I secured 1200 feet of #24 magnet wire from a motor rewinding shop at a cost of \$20. I rummaged some empty spools from the trash and went to the harbor. I found a secondhand marine shop that had tons of interesting things, electronic and nautical. Another \$20 got me two strong ten-foot trolling rods and a spool of 60 lb test line.

That same day I found some eight-foot grey PVC pipes at a construction site. The were thick walled and fairly rigid; I asked permission and happily took them home.

I was living in a top/third floor unit and had access to the flat roof. The building was square at 120 feet a side. I had decided on a three-wire "micro-rhombic" with 68 feet per side. The PVC pipe was installed at the planned feed point and terminus corners by clamping to vent outlets and guyed in three directions with nylon line.

Some adjustable TV standoff insulators held the guys and a small stainless steel pulley. The old fishing rods took up position in the other corners with three paper clips attached to the eyelets three feet apart. All the measuring and grunt work took six hours.

A local Ham shop provided a package of three an a half inch stiff nylon spacers with lil notches cut in each end. The wire was pushed into a pair of these spacers and held fast. My feed line was a snap. I had used a half inch wooden dowel through the spool of magnet wire and set it in an open cardboard box with a notch cut in each side.

I very carefully grasped the wire end and slowly made my way along two sides. After securing the end, I returned halfway to the fishing pole and raised the wire to the top eyelet. This process was repeated five more times, with the side wires separated nicely. The last run on each side was 10 feet longer.

I sandpapered off the enamel coating and mechanically secured and then soldered three wires together. I had decided not to terminate the antenna, so the "far end" was open a few inches, I used four inch square clear 1/4 inch nylon stock with three holes. At the feed point mast, the extra wire made up my feed line, which I cut to a foot above the roof where I connected the center conductor of some water-proof coax and cut away the outside braid.

All connections were sprayed with varnish and I also wrapped denso tape around the coax, at the antenna I grounded the outer braids.

The next week I passed my theory with 76% and 12 WPM lets me work all QRG's. I loaded up the old rig I was lent and tuned on 14.040. Answering a CW, I had my first QSO with a station in California. I was sweating so hard my finger kept sliding off the key!

I called up my Elmer, Jack, VE7DBK, and then he told me I was QRP - "The rig only puts out 4 watts". Needless to say the antenna worked great, and I would ragchew into ZL around midnight local. The antenna worked well in all directions.

My last temporary "hidden antenna" hardly got out at all in comparison. It was a pair of 66 ft and 34 ft wires "up" in a hedge with a balun to waterproof coax.

Fellow FISTS member, Mike AH7R at the University of Hawaii did the math for me and advised that with 100 watts in, I was getting 18 out on 80 meters. He reassured me, however, that was still enough power, and I was able to get into Alaska on 40 and 80, as well as keep my TCC sked on 20. At the present QTH, I'm using the WorldRadio telescoping masts - I painted them grey. 73 - Dave VE7DWG

You just gotta try QRP! And when you do, build a Wilderness NC40A

If you've ever thought about QRP, but decided against it because the radios seemed like toys, you are not alone. I never could understand what could be so interesting about under powered poor performing QRP radios. In a weak moment, and after reading an article in the December 2000 issue of QST I finally decided to find out. About a week after I sent a check to Wilderness Radio a little tiny box arrived in my mail. Inside was a detailed manual, a top-rate custom enclosure, and a couple of baggies of loose parts. It didn't look like much, and certainly no where near enough parts to make a decent radio

I was wrong in a big way!

I hadn't put anything in the way of electronics together for a long time, so I took it slow. In about 45 minutes, I had all the parts inventoried and arranged on a couple of sheets of notebook paper. I scotch-taped each part to the paper so I wouldn't loose too many pieces.

The single circuit board was very well made, and the plated-through holes were smaller than I expected. The next thing I did was run down to Radio Shack and buy a 15 watt pencil soldering iron with a fine tip. Believe me, you better do this, the parts are small and very compactly arranged on the board. The instructions recommend using 2% silver solder - do this also. This solder is a joy to use, flows very well and leaves barely any residue at all.

Aside from the solder, nothing else is needed to build and operate this radio (a magnifying glass would have been nice for my feeble eyesight). For the next two evenings I was squinting at resistor color codes, and minuscule printing on teensy little caps. There are some toroids to wind, but don't let that scare you. I'd never done it before either. I did make one mistake, I tried winding one toroid

with the wrong size wire. Don't do this! Luckily, I noticed it in time and re-wound the darned thing with no problems. The instructions in the step-by-step manual are exactly correct.

Look at the pictures, and follow the instructions. Your radio will work. I know this is true, because mine did.


When I said mine worked, did I mentions that it worked instantly the first time I applied power? Well, to my genuine amazement, it did! Alignment is a snap, and no special tools or instruments are needed.

The best part is how well, the receiver works. I swear, the receiver in this QRP Transceiver is just as capable of pulling weak signals out of the muck as is my regular rig. I've got an Elecraft K2, which is a good radio even by today's standards. The Wilderness Radio NorCal 40A is a REAL rig, not a gimmick or a toy. I was on the air before the last solder joint had cooled and made several contacts thousands of miles away using my barely marginal vertical all-band antenna.

Nowadays, the only thing I use the SB-1000 amp for is as a perch for Conan my jumbo sized cat. He hasn't been in the shack much lately. I guess its the searing heat put out by the amp that he really likes. I thought he was copying code all this time.

I've been operating QRP on 40 meters lately, and believe me, with QRP the thrill is back! Every time someone answers my CQ I'm shocked that my measly 2-watt signal can be heard. But they really do hear me, and I can hear them too. I usually use my K2 and tuner to get the antenna matched to around 7.025 before I switch the coax to the NorCal 40A. The neat thing about this is that I can flip the coax switch and get the K2 listening through the same antenna as the QRP rig. Usually there isn't any detectable loss of signal from one to the other. I know, I know you don't believe it. Well, I didn't believe it either when I read a similar claim in a Ham magazine. That's why I had to try it myself.

The coolest feature of this hot little radio is the built-in memory keyer. What's so cool about a memory keyer these days? This keyer will tell you what the operating frequency is at any point in the band, and will also tell you when a desired frequency has been reached! Aside from that, the keyer allows setting of QSK, Iambic mode, key-down function, and a bunch of other stuff. Neat-O to say the least. The KC-1 memory keyer is optional, but I strongly suggest you buy it right away. It comes with a front panel drilled and labeled for a really professional look. I highly recommend this QRP kit. Get in touch with my friend QRP Bob at Wilderness Radio NorCal 40A and have him kit one up for you!

Oh, and by the way . . . I don't work for Wilderness radio, they didn't pay me to say this, and I didn't even get a free radio. I did talk to QRP Bob on the telephone when I was putting the kit together. I was a little worried about one of the steps. He listened to me, assured me that everything was going to be OK, and to just do exactly what it says. "Yes", he said, "the instructions are correct and the radio will work".

Signor Marconi's Magic Box by Paul WA9PWP FISTS 2153

If you are interested in early "wireless" pioneers, you need to read "Signor Marconi's Magic Box" by Gavin Weightman, 2003, DaCapo Press.

Apparently the book has been "remaindered" as it can be bought for less than \$3 on Amazon.com. This hardcover book of almost 300 pages, with 16 pages of historical photos and reproductions of documents (the first radiogram?) has an amazing amount of historical information on not only Guglielmo Marconi but also is a "who's who" of seemingly all of the early radio experimenters and inventors.

The author has researched this subject well. It is almost as if he had been following Marconi around and taking notes, as Marconi progressed from simple spark transmission and receiving on his family's estate at Pontecchio, Italy to spanning the Atlantic from Poldhu, England to Signal Hill, Newfoundland, and beyond. Yes, Signor Marconi was Italian, but why did he spend most of his time experimenting in England? You will have to read the book to find out!

I could go on and on, there are so many interesting facts and people in the book. How about Marconi's glass eye? Benito Mussolini? Marconi was so honored in his time and afterward because he was very devoted to concrete research and proven results, unlike other early radio pioneers who promised much and delivered little.
